### **PTG Exam Study Session**

#### The Future of the Piano

We have work if people buy, play, and maintain pianos.

"The Value of a piano today"

Principles of Investment and return: You buy a piano at wholesale, invest time and money, and sell to earn a profit. The amount of the profit increases as your investment increases, such as buying a higher quality piano, and rebuilding rather than refurbishing. You can increase the profits by adding services and accessories that add value such as moving, tuning, DamppChaser, bench, lamp, touchup, refinishing, etc.

Reality check: The value of any item is "what people will pay for it". The prices go up if there is more demand than product. The prices go down if getting rid of the piano is more important than waiting for someone willing to pay a higher price. Here is an analysis of the "Wichita Craig's List" for 45 days in August and September 2011. The pianos are priced higher if a piano technician was involved by rebuilding, refurbishing, tuning, or simply appraising:


