

**Farewell:** Travis Leonard Gordy, February 13, 1924, Tulsa, Oklahoma to October 29, 2009, Salina, Kansas

Travis graduated from high school in Benton, Arkansas, where he played trumpet in his own dance band and built and flew model airplanes. He graduated from the University of Oklahoma in 1946 with a degree in mechanical engineering after serving in the navy in World War II. He began working for Continental Oil Company in 1948 in Ponca City, Oklahoma, and held more than 60 patents in wax and coke research. The last few years at Conoco were spent traveling the world teaching coking technology. He retired from R and D Leadership at Conoco in 1985. For over 50 years, Travis tuned and rebuilt pianos for private and professional performances and competition and much sought after as a piano technician serving Ponca City, Bartlesville, Newkirk, Arkansas City, Blackwell, Tonkawa and other communities. Travis was the tenor in a championship barbershop quartet, The Escorts, which won the SPEBSQSA Southwest District Championship in 1964. He rehearsed and coached the quartet for many years, arranging and writing music and choreographing performances.

Was it you? I tuned a 1915 Hamilton upright. At first I tried to adjust the backchecks, let off, capstans... but the real problem was missing center pins. Many whippens were lacking pins



for the drop stickers. A technician from the past had left it that way, and just made adjustments to the capstans to keep it working! Some of the



unbushed pin holes in the whippen were badly worn, but a size 18 1/2 center pin fit tightly in the bushed drop sticker. You never know what tools you will need when you head out the door.
